ACTIVITY THREE

I CAN BE ANYTHING IF...

It is one thing to want to be a sports superstar and it's another to put in the grinding practice and training that might make it possible. It's important for students to understand the essential role that personal responsibility plays in making their career dreams come true.

One way to do this is to help them collect clues about their aptitudes, interests, and educational stamina. For instance, a student may say they want to be a surgeon. However, they have no interest whatsoever in spending a dozen years in college and training. Discovering this career clue now can help them channel their medical interests into a more personally appropriate direction.

The student activity starts with the student naming a favorite career. It could be the one they shared in the Guess What I Want to Be activity last week or another one that appeals to them.

Then students dig for answers to five questions. Answers may come from personal opinion, insight from their parent/adult "coach," or from research they uncover online or in books.

The adult activity shares a similar format. However, instead of looking forward the adult answers questions about their current career or unpacks reasons why an earlier career ambition changed.

Student and adult discuss their answers in supportive and, sometimes cautionary, ways.
